A memorable NPMD 2025 at Coventry Cathedral

On 28th September 2025, we gathered at the majestic Coventry Cathedral for the 22nd National Police Memorial Day (NPMD).

The steps, ruins of the old Cathedral and Square were filled with historic police vehicles, Standards from almost all forces and a Guard of Honour to welcome those attending – thank you to all who took part in this display.

Secretaries of State and Police Chiefs joined a congregation of more than 1,400, standing in unity to remember officers who gave their lives in service – many in horrific circumstances.

Pre-service films

Shortly before the service, we played a series of short films to the congregation.

This being the 85th anniversary year of the Coventry Blitz, we commemorated police officers lost in World War II, by playing [this short film produced by The Police Arboretum Memorial Trust](#).

During the service, candles are lit by family members to commemorate police officers who have died on duty in each of the four nations of the United Kingdom.



Reception at the United States Embassy, London

Trustees of the Police Remembrance Trust hosted a private reception at the United States Embassy on 9th December 2025. Those present included families of officers who died on duty in the past year, participants in NPMD 2025, volunteers, supporters, and sponsors.

We were joined by the Minister of State for Policing and Crime, Sarah Jones MP, who spent time chatting with families and other guests.

Recognition was given to the recent loss of PC Mathew Parker from Essex Police, as his name was added to the Police Roll of Honour.

Those present reflected on Coventry and gave thanks to those who enable this important annual event in the policing calendar to happen.

Acknowledgment and gratitude was given for the ongoing support of police forces in England, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Wales, non-Home Office forces, and several sponsors including Serve and Protect, and PoliceFriendly.

Awards were presented to several fundraisers for the charity, including one to Mark Jones and Trystan Bevan from North Wales Police who presented a cheque for £5,000 to the Trust earlier on this year, at the North Wales Police Bravery Awards.

We are very grateful to all who help raise funds for the charity.

Special Agents added to the Police Roll of Honour

The Trust has developed a strong link with the US Embassy and other US Law Enforcement Memorial Charities since 2018, when US Special Agent Nole Remagen sadly died on a presidential visit to the UK. Nole was subsequently added to the Roll of Honour.

The Trust was recently made aware that two American Special Agents - Daniel Emmett O'Connor and Ronald Albert Lariviere were killed in the terrorist attack on PanAm103 on 21st December 1988. Their names are now also on the Roll of Honour.
